At Church Eaton we are committed to ensuring that:

### Challenges

1	Learning walks, data analysis and pupil discussions have identified that many PP children are exhibiting <b>social, emotional and well-being needs</b> .
2	<b>Anxiety</b> issues identified through learning walks, data analysis and pupil discussions.
3	<b>Confidence</b> issues identified through learning walks, data analysis and pupil discussions.
4	The triangulation of data has highlighted that the Covid 19 Pandemic and school closure has resulted in a reduction in the level of pupil <b>resilience and attainment</b> .
5	The <b>Attendance</b> of Pupil Premium pupils (91.7%) is slightly lower than Non pupil Premium Pupils (92.8%)

## Part B: Review of outcomes in the previous academic year

### Pupil premium strategy outcomes

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2021 to 2022 academic year.

1. Focussed intervention, support and individualised teaching was implemented to address misconceptions, gaps and weaknesses in English. Analysis of the summer term data it has been possible to identify that PP children continue to be behind their peers in terms of attainment (91) although the gap has continued to narrow in most years groups. The majority of Individual pupils were shown to be making at least expected and better progress in Reading and Writing (10.0). However attainment in SPAG was below expected (88.3). The success criteria was partially met with the majority of PP pupils making expected and better progress in Writing, Reading and SPAG.
2. Individualised maths support focuses and intervention were implemented to address misconceptions and develop confidence. Analysis of the summer term data identify that PP children are making better than expected progress (8.1) but continue to be behind their peers in terms of attainment although the gap has continued to narrow in most years groups (90.3). This success criteria was met with majority of pupils are in attaining well and making at least expected progress in Maths
3. Individual pupil's Emotional Health and Welfare needs were met through focussed support to develop children's self-confidence and ability to deal with potentially difficult situations. Enhance learning behaviours where required. This success criteria was met with pupils developing increased self-confidence and the ability to deal with potentially difficult situations.
4. PP attendance (90.8%) is slightly lower than Non PP (91.85%) by 1.05%.
