The school is expecting a total of **£16,600** in this academic year.

<p>Evaluation All completed. Play supervisor led an set programme of events. In pupil surveys completed in May 23. 90 5 of children were happy with activities run by the school. This is an increase of 10 5 from 21-22</p>

<p>Evaluation <i>The PE coordinator going on the course allowed him to lead us through the curriculum design process which developed a PE programme that suited the children’s needs and was more challenging and engaging than we had previously. As a result of this overview a new bespoke PEE curriculum will be put in place for 23- 24 led by a specialist PE teacher.</i></p>	
<p>Indicator 4: Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils.</p>

<p>Evaluation After school club offered. Limited impact due to poor attendance. This will not be continued in 23-24</p>

<p>Evaluation Not effective. More must be done to promote attendance at school events in 23- 24 and increase links with high schools and other local small schools. Children have become involved with local cricket and rugby club but an opportunity to expand links needs to be explored further</p>
